#### "Investing Our Lives in Things that Matter"

In my NLT Life Application Study Bible, Luke 12:13-21 reads like this:

<sup>13</sup> Then someone called from the crowd, "Teacher, please tell my brother to divide our father's estate with me."

<sup>14</sup> Jesus replied, "Friend, who made me a judge over you to decide such things as that?" <sup>15</sup>Then he said,

"Beware! Guard against every kind of greed. Life is not measured by how much you own." <sup>16</sup> Then he told them a story: "A rich man had a fertile farm that produced fine crops. <sup>17</sup> He said to himself, 'What should I do? I don't have room for all my crops.' <sup>18</sup>Then he said, 'I know! I'll tear down my barns and build bigger ones. Then I'll have room enough to store all my wheat and other goods. <sup>19</sup>And I'll sit back and say to myself, "My friend, you have enough stored away for years to come. Now take it easy! Eat, drink, and be merry!"'

<sup>20</sup>"But God said to him, 'You fool! You will die this very night. Then who will get everything you worked for?' <sup>21</sup>"Yes, a person is a fool to store up earthly wealth but not have a rich relationship with God."

The longer I live—and the more I read my Bible and pray—the more I feel I need to daily question whether I am investing my life in things that matter. The rich man in the parable certainly had not invested his life in the right place; God called him a fool and took his life from him that same day.

Sometimes I think that maybe the meaning of this parable slides right by us. Too many people probably read the parable and think, "Well, Jesus is certainly not talking to me; I am not rich. I am not building bigger 'barns." But that is the wrong approach. I believe that Jesus is addressing people's hearts and motives—not just how much money or how many possessions we have. Jesus tells us in Matthew 6, "Don't store up treasures here on earth, where moths eat them and rust destroys them, and where thieves break in and steal. Store your treasures in heaven, where moths and rust cannot destroy, and thieves do not break in and steal. Wherever your treasure is, there the desires of your heart will also be."

Fifty plus years ago (that's close enough), I sang bass in a Gospel/barbershop quartet at Eastern Baptist College. One Sunday morning, we sang a song for the 11 a.m. worship service at Central Baptist Church in Wayne, Pennsylvania. Since we were there early and the sanctuary was empty, we practiced our number, "This World Is Not My Home." The pastor came in, stopped, and listened. When we finished, he said, "That's great singing but lousy theology." I have never forgotten his statement because I did not agree with that Baptist pastor then, and I still do not agree with him.

This world is NOT my home, and I AM just passing through. Even while Christians are still here on earth, we are to think of ourselves as aliens (I Peter 2:11) and as "citizens of heaven" (Philippians 3:21). Being citizens of heaven does not mean that "we are so heavenly minded that we are no earthly good." I have never met a true heavenly minded believer who is no earthly good. A true Christian believer is seeking to be just like Jesus. A true Christian believer is keeping the Great Commandments (Matthew 22:37-39) and the Great Commission (Matthew 28: 19 & 20). In the process of doing that, we are storing up our treasures in heaven, we are showing that we are citizens of heaven, and we ARE investing our lives in the things that matter—loving and serving God our Father and loving and serving people around us. All of us at Jefferson First Baptist need to be doing that.

**Koinonia Camp & Conference Center** is our mission partner for September. Summer camping season has ended, but that is only one part of the year-round-ministry that goes on at Koinonia. Check out their newsletter on the bulletin board at the north entrance to the church sanctuary.

Check out page 2 of their newsletter for a unique ministry going on right now. YOU can help out with this outreach if you are available on Monday or Thursday evenings for at least 45 minutes. All you have to do is walk next to a horse while children with challenges ride the horses. Each rider needs between 2 and 3 walkers to make each session possible. #### **Operation Christmas Child**

Different people get involved in Operation Christmas child in different ways. Some pack just one box, while others pack multiple boxes. Some donate items for others to put in their boxes but never pack a box of their own. Some people watch for bargains all year round. Others fill their boxes with just one shopping trip; some donate money. But the first thing to do is pray that the Lord will show you how He would like you to be involved in this ministry. If the Lord leads you to pack a box or boxes, you can pray for direction as to what you put in your box.

When you have made your gift selections, you are ready to pack your shoe box. You may use an actual shoebox covered with or without Christmas wrap. Samaritan's Purse preprinted boxes will soon be available at the church for you to pick up. New this year will be specially designed plastic Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes. Yes, you can purchase other plastic boxes, but OCC plastic boxes are designed to withstand riggers of shipping.

Homesafe Inc. is a private, non-profit community agency, committed to breaking the cycle of violence in Ashtabula County and it's surrounding areas through the provision of emergency and non-emergency services. Their mission is to assure greater awareness of the problems of domestic violence and abuse through the education and empowerment of individuals, families, and the community.

A woman is beaten every 9 seconds in this county. Domestic violence is the leading cause of injury to women. One of two women will be abused during their lifetime and over 53% of male abusers also beat their children.
